Course Prerequisites/co-requisites: PSY 1000 with a grade of 'C' or higher.



# **Course Expectations**

# **General Expectations**

It is expected that students will devote at least <u>10-15 hours</u> per week on this course, split between reading the textbook, listening to lectures, completing assignments, and meeting with the professor virtually (if needed). Students are expected to complete all assignments individually. It is extremely important that students have consistent access to an internet connection.

# **Expectations for the Instructor**

# **Course Content**

*All course content will be posted on Moodle.* Every Monday morning by 7-8am, I will post online lectures (up to 2), the lecture quiz(zes), the reading quiz, and exams under the week subheadings. The assigned readings for each week are indicated on the syllabus. Students are required to read the assigned textbook chapters or articles (see schedule below) and watch <u>all</u> online video lectures, and then complete lecture quizzes, reading quizzes, and exams. See schedule for all assignment due dates.

# **Grade Determination**

The class is out of 400 total points split between 3 grade categories: Lecture Quizzes, Reading Quizzes, and Exams.

- 18.75% Lecture Quizzes: There will be 1 weekly lecture quiz for every 1 online lecture (maximum of 2 lecture quizzes per week). You are required to watch each lecture and then complete a lecture quiz that assesses your knowledge of the information presented in each lecture. There will be a total of 12 lecture quizzes throughout the semester, and each quiz is worth a total of 5 points. Your two lowest lecture quiz scores will be replaced by your two highest lecture quizzes are due Fridays at 11:59pm.
- 18.75% Reading Quizzes: There will be 1 reading quiz corresponding with each assigned textbook chapter(s). You are required to read the assigned chapters during the week and then complete the corresponding reading quiz. There will be a total of 13 reading quizzes throughout the semester, and each quiz is worth a total of 5 points. One reading quiz will be dropped at the end of the semester and will not be counted towards your final grade. With the exception of Week 1, 13, & 14, all reading quizzes are due Fridays at 11:59pm.

62.5% - Exams: There will be a total of 4 exams throughout the semester. Each exam is worth a • total of 50 points (15% of your final grade). Exams 1-3 are not cumulative, and exam 4 is cumulative. Exam 4 is the final exam. Your lowest exam score will be replaced with your highest exam score at the end of the semester.

# Make-up Work

No make-up coursework is permitted. There will NOT be opportunities to make up missed quizzes or exams unless you can provide a legitimate excuse of your reason for being unable to submit them (e.g., medical emergency with doctor's note, loss of a reliable internet connection). If you cannot complete these assignments on the assigned due dates, it is your responsibility to complete them early. See Excused Absence Policy for approved sporting activity related absences.
