Course Description

Humans are, by nature, sexual beings; evolved biological organisms that sexually reproduce. This course explores human sexuality through the lens of biopsychology, a subdiscipline that examines the interplay of biological mechanisms, mental processes, and behavior. To that end, this course covers a range of topics including, but not limited to, the nature and evolution of biological sex, mating systems, sexual development, sexual behavior, romantic partner preferences, attraction, love, romantic relationships, infidelity, sexual orientation, and sexual conflict.

Student Learning Goals

- Apply principles of evolutionary biology to the study of human sexuality.
- Analyze and summarize primary academic sources relevant to the discipline.
- Describe, explain, and make predictions about the underlying biological and psychological factors that give rise to sexual behavior.
- Demonstrate an understanding of normal

variability in human sexuality (e.g., sexual orientation) versus harmful sexual expression (e.g., sexual coercion, paraphilia).

The above student learning goals will be assessed through performance on written and oral assessments.

Disclaimer

This course deals with sexually explicit content and topics that may make people uncomfortable. Some material in this course may touch on issues of personal relevance and/ or may be personally upsetting – topics such as sexual orientation, sex differences, sexual assault, etc. Furthermore, some content may challenge your beliefs about human sexuality. The goal of this class is not to tell you what to think; rather, this class will introduce you to prominent theories and cutting-edge research so that you can cultivate a well-informed and nuanced understanding of human sexuality.

Course Content

All course content is available on Canvas. This includes required readings, assessments, and supplemental materials. All assessments can be accessed and completed via Canvas. See the course schedule below for specific due dates.

Grade Determination

The class is out of 400 total points split between 5 grade categories:

30 points – Attendance: Attending class sessions is <u>mandatory</u>. Each class that you attend is worth 1 point.

100 points – Weekly Quizzes: From Weeks 2-13, there will be a quiz (~10 questions) that assesses your knowledge/understanding of the information presented in the lectures and reading(s) during the previous week. All weekly quizzes are due by 4:00pm on Monday, and can be found in the "Quizzes" tab on Canvas. Each weekly quiz is worth 10 points. You will only earn full credit if you complete your quiz on time, and attend Monday's class session.

150 points – **Article Summaries:** Every week, you will read peer-reviewed journal articles (e.g., research studies), and then answer questions about their purpose, methodology, findings, concepts, and/or theories. The articles will be posted under the weekly modules (see: Modules tab on Canvas) as well as embedded within the assignments. Article summary assignments can be found in the "Assignments" tab on Canvas, and each article summary is worth 10 points.

90 points – Discussion Questions: Every Wednesday you are <u>required to submit 3 discussion</u> <u>questions</u>. You can pose any questions (and I mean ANY) about the lectures, assigned readings, or how the course topics relate to the real world. You will only earn full credit if you pose "thoughtful" questions (i.e., they cannot be answered with a simple yes or no), submit your discussion questions on time, and attend Wednesday's class session. Grades will be assigned based on the degree to which the questions reflect critical thinking and thoughtful reflection of course material. Each set of three questions is worth 5 points can be found in the "Assignments" tab on Canvas.

30 points - The Hotseat: On two separate occasions, each student will summarize the assigned reading verbally for the entire class in \sim 15 minutes or less. Students will sign up for their two dates at the start of the semester. Grades will be assigned based on the accuracy, clarity, and conciseness of their summary of the reading. Each day that you are on the hotseat is worth 15 points.

• In this class, students can freely discuss controversial/taboo topics without judgment. Nothing is too sacred to discuss here. But keep in mind that many students come from different backgrounds, have different views, and have different life experiences. We all have unique perspectives to share with one another. It is essential that students engage with one another in a respectful manner. Insulting and belittling other students (or someone's sexual proclivities) will not be tolerated. Disrespectful behavior will be addressed by (1) a general announcement, (2) direct announcement, (3) or a request to leave the class if the derogation is serious enough or persists.

Course Expectations

General Expectations

All correspondence (emails, meetings, phone calls) must be in **English**. - (3) I (the instructor) will grade all assignments in a timely manner [within 2-3 days].

Course Policies

Class Attendance Policy

Students who do not attend the first class meeting will be dropped from the course by the academic department that offers the course. This policy applies to all levels of courses and to all

campuses and study centers. It remains the student's responsibility to verify course drops and check that fees are adjusted.

Tardiness (defined as showing up more than 5-minutes late after the start of class) and Absence will result in harsh penalties to your grade unless you have a legitimate excuse (and documentation to corroborate it). Unexcused Absence and Tardiness will negate your attendance grade for that day. Unexcused Tardiness will result in a 50% penalty to the total points on all assessments due that day. Unexcused absence will result in a loss of all points possible that day.

If you miss class for any reason, you are responsible for staying up-to date on the required readings and catching up on missed lecture material. If you fail to submit an assessment, you cannot make it up (unless you have a legitimate excuse and documentation to show it). I strongly recommend that you get the names, phone numbers, and email addresses of at least 3 people in this class from whom you can get missed notes.

If it is not possible to notify me in advance (e.g., for last-minute illness or emergency), contact me by email as soon as possible. The professor has the right to ask for documentation to corroborate your excuse. All makeups must occur as soon as possible.

Grade Disputes

If something seems wrong with your grade, please bring it to my attention as soon as possible. Honest mistakes do occasionally happen. If you would like to dispute a grade, you will have 7 days to bring your grade dispute to my attention. However, in order for me to amend your grade, you cannot simply state that I am wrong; you must appeal to me using concrete evidence and/or logical reasoning for why you deserve a better grade.

Incomplete ("I") grades will not be assigned, except in the case of exceptional unforeseen circumstances that occur within the last three weeks of the semester and your work has otherwise been satisfactory (C average).
